MESSAGE

I am very happy to learn that the Indian Society of Agricultural Statistics is bringing out a Memorial Volume in the name of Late Professor P.V. Sukhatme. The significant contributions of the Society in promoting the cause of Agricultural Statistics are well known.

Prof. P.V. Sukhatme contributed significantly towards research in Statistical Theory of Sampling, such as bipartitional functions under the guidance of world authorities like Sir R.A. Fisher and 'Contributions to the theory of the representative method' under the guidance of J. Neyman and E.S. Pearson. The latter paper laid solid foundation for his subsequent pioneering research in the theory of surveys and improvement of agricultural statistics which ushered in what may be appropriately termed as the Sukhatme era in the development of agricultural statistics in the world.

He served as Regents Professor, University of California at Berkeley and thereafter he settled in Pune, carrying out valuable work on nutrition at the Maharashtra Association for the Cultivation of Science, Prof. Sukhatme was well known in this field especially for the Sukhatme-Margen hypothesis that at low levels of calorie intake, energy is used with greater metabolic efficiency and efficiency decreases as the intake increases over the homeostatic range.

Prof. Sukhatme rendered distinguished service to the cause of Statistics and its application to agriculture and allied fields. He was conferred with the honour of Sankhyiki Bhushan in 1989 by the Indian Society of Agricultural Statistics, New Delhi for his valuable contributions. He was the President of the Society during 1991 and the Executive President of the Society from 1970 till January 1997.

I am sure, this publication of the Society will not only make a valuable contribution to the Scientific fraternity in India and abroad, but shall also be an appropriate tribute to an eminent agricultural statistician of India.
